


National Maritime Museum of Korea "Embodying the Sea, Connecting the World"



The Sea in Our Lives

The exhibition details the development of global navigation technology, worldwide maritime vessels, and Korea's navigation vessels and provides insights into global maritime powers throughout history, reflecting the idea that those who dominate the seas dominate the world.
